### From the Pastor's Desk...

#### Friends,

As you receive this newsletter, the Christmas season will be upon us. I invite you to enjoy all 12 days of Christmas and punctuate the season with an Epiphany celebration on January 6. We'll celebrate the visit of the magi to Jesus one day early in worship on Sunday, January 5 when we receive our new Epiphany star words.

When we went Christmas caroling in December, we were singing to a church member at her home, when one of her neighbors dashed over to speak with us. She asked if we could come share a carol with her son. We said yes! The child was eight or nine years old, and I think had heard of caroling, but never seen it actually done. We were delighted to sing a carol for their family and then "We Wish You a Merry Christmas!" We told them where we were from and invited their family to church. It was a joyful surprise and a lovely way for us to be present in our community. We just never know when God will help us create a meaningful connection!





Our Session often reflects on the kind of welcome we offer to folks and how we are present in our community. Many of us are grateful for the ways it feels like the Spirit is at work among us. So I've been reflecting on why things feel this way in our congregation right now. When I had coffee with a new member recently, they asked me why and how our church had gotten through the pandemic pretty well together. I told them it was luck, God's grace, and because we have a high degree of trust among members, leadership, and staff. Trust feels so important, and yet also hard for me to pin down.

Our Presbytery's Stated Clerk recently wrote about trust in her newsletter. Her thoughts gave words to things I feel, but could not articulate. She shared two definitions of trust. The first, from author Brené Brown, who credits Charles Feltman (author of "The Thin Book of Trust"), which says, "Trust is choosing to make something important to you vulnerable to the actions of someone else." The second from Prentis Hemphill's new book, "What it Takes to Heal: How Transforming Ourselves Can Change the World," which says, "Trust is a risk we take with one another to do something bigger than we could have done alone." Both of those definitions speak to me about what we do/have/experience here at FPCRO. Those kinds of trusts are one of the greatest gifts we could share in our life of faith together. Thank you for the trust you place in me. It is a joy to serve a congregation where I feel such a high degree of trust you, the leadership and membership of the church. I look forward to venturing into 2025 together with you!



#### **Men's Fellowship Group**



conversation. If you can't make it at 7:30pm, come when you can and we'll weave you into one of the conversations!



## **Generosity and Resources**

#### All Creatures Great and Small— Annual Pledge Campaign

Get ready for sparrows, lions, giraffes and more to visit us in worship through the month of February as we celebrate all creatures great and small. The Generosity and Resources committee praises God for all the ways God cares for our community. And for the ways the members of this congregation care for one another and reach out to the wider world. Together, we care for God's creatures great and small. Together, we seek to bless people young and old throughout all their years. The gifts, offerings, and pledges of the congregation make all these connections, care, and ministries possible. This year, we are invited to fly, spring, or stretch as we make our financial pledges to God and the church.



Look for your "creature" packet in the mail ahead of **February 2**. Pray and plan about your giving for the next fiscal year, which begins on August 1. Then return your pledge card on or before **Sunday, February 16**. We are grateful for your gifts!

#### TAX SAVING OPPORTUNITY FOR SENIORS

If you are 70-½ or older, this information could be helpful to you! You may find you can no longer deduct your charitable gifts on your taxes with the increased standard deduction. But, if you are a retiree over age 70-½, the IRS offers a workaround which preserves the tax benefit of giving. If you have an IRA account, you are required to take Required Minimum Contributions (RMDs). You may donate all or a portion of your RMD, up to \$108,000, directly to a qualified charity and not have to pay taxes on the charitable portion of your distribution.

### Can a Qualified Charitable Distribution to FPCRO from Your IRA Bring You Tax Benefits?

A qualified charitable distribution (QCD), also known as an IRA charitable rollover gift, allows individuals 70-½ or older to make an outright gift of up to \$108,000 from an IRA directly to FPCRO and exclude it from taxable income.

#### **Requirements of a QCD**

- The IRA account holder must be age 70-½ or older at the time the distribution is made to FPCRO.
- Distributions are limited to \$108,000 per individual per year and must be transferred directly from the IRA custodian to FPCRO.
- Distributions can only be directed from a traditional or Roth IRA (not from a retirement plan such as a 401(k), 403(b), etc.).
- Distributions cannot be made to a donor advised fund or supporting organization (including most private foundations), or used to fund a charitable gift annuity, or charitable remainder trust.

No goods, services, or income can be received by the donor in exchange for the gift. Donors should consult their financial adviser, as other requirements may apply.

#### **Benefits of a QCD**

- Satisfies all or part of annual required minimum distributions (RMD) and provides a charitable giving strategy for donors who do not need the additional income.
- May be used to fulfill any outstanding pledges.
- Maximizes giving by allowing donors to give outside of the 60 percent of adjusted gross income (AGI) charitable deduction limit.
- Provides value for nonitemizers and donors who live in states that do not allow charitable deductions.
- Minimizes tax liability and can put donors at a lower threshold for Medicare premiums by reducing income.
- Reduces your adjusted gross income (AGI) which could reduce the amount of your social security being taxed.

Donors should work closely with their IRA custodian to request a direct distribution to FPCRO. Please talk to Kari Peruski for more information.
